UHC 101

Student ID Cards

All students must have a valid student ID card. This card is good for your duration at UHC, and can be obtained through the Office of Admissions. Use your ID to print in the computer labs, check out library books, and make purchases with Bayou Bucks in the café. If your ID is lost or stolen, contact the Office of Admissions for a replacement. **Replacement IDs are \$5, and the Office of Admissions can only accept cash.**

Parking

All vehicles parked on campus must display a current parking tag, usually displayed on the interior of your windshield. Parking passes can be picked up through Campus Police, following purchase of the parking pass in Self Service. Please be sure to bring receipt of purchase and your driver's license, vehicular registration, and insurance card in order to obtain the parking pass. Student parking is permitted only in designated areas marked by signs indicating student parking. If your parking pass is lost or misplaced, you can obtain a replacement through Campus Police.

Center for Teaching and Learning

The transition from high school to college, or from one career to another, can be challenging. Students may need extra help to ease the way. The CTL offers free tutoring, assistance in improving overall academic skills, guidance in choosing a major, placement testing, and more. Disability Services

Student Health Services

FERPA

FERPA stands for Family Education Rights & Privacy Act. In accordance with FERPA, UHC students may review any official records and data directly related to them that our on file in the administrative offices. FERPA allows students to designate how their records and data are used and disclosed to others, including parents. An information sheet with detailed FERPA guidelines can be found in the Registrar's Office on the first floor.



Higher Ed Dictionary

Academic Calendar: a comprehensive calendar available at <u>uhcno.edu</u> that includes all important dates—holidays, beginning and end of semesters, last day to drop a class, when fees are due, etc.

Academic Plan: a comprehensive view of courses taken, courses currently scheduled, and courses still needed to complete degree requirements.

Academic Skills Center: also known as the computer lab on campus; students may print utilizing their student ID for a small fee.

Advisor: a faculty member assigned to help students plan their course schedules to fit each student's degree and career plans.

Audit: a scheduled course for experience or interest, but not for a grade or credit.

Bayou Bucks: preloaded money on your student ID that can be used for food services.

Canvas: the online system used by students to monitor their class assignments and deadlines, communicate with the instructor and classmates, and post online assignments.

Catalog: includes campus policies and procedures, contact information, degree requirements, and course descriptions available at <u>uhcno.edu</u>.

Co-requisite: two courses that must be taken during the same semester.

Credit hour: a unit of academic credit; one hour a week for an academic semester.

Degree: title conferred on students by a college, university, or professional school on completion of a program of study. UHC offers Associate, Bachelor's, Master's, and Doctoral degrees.

FAFSA: the Free Application for Federal Student Aid, available online at <u>fafsa.ed.gov</u>. It must be filled out each year to receive financial aid. Our school code is 002023.

Hurricane Café: located on the first floor, the café is the sources of all your food service needs including coffee, pastries, salads, snacks, and hot meal selections.

Major: subject of academic study chosen as a field of specialization.



Higher Ed Dictionary

Marianites: an international Catholic congregation of women religiously serving God's people since 1841, founded by Fr. Basil Moreau. Marianites of Holy Cross are apostolic, religious women of prayer and compassion. The mission, energized by their life in community, is to incarnate the love and compassion of Jesus Christ. Called to be a prophetic presence in an ever-changing world, they resolutely stand with those who are excluded.

Minor: an academic subject requiring fewer courses than a major, generally 18 credit hours.

Plagiarism: the unacknowledged inclusion of someone else's words, ideas, or data as one's own work submitted for credit.

Prerequisite: course(s) that must be completed prior to enrolling in a specific class.

Schedule: available each semester online with the list of course offerings.

Section: the specific number assigned to a course that identifies it based on the day and time of class meetings.

Self Service: the program used by currently enrolled students to register for classes, keep track of their degree requirements, and make online payments.

Semester: usually 15-week periods of instruction into which an academic year is often divided. UHC has Fall, Spring, and Summer semesters.

SGA: Student Government Association.

Spes Unica: Latin for "Only Hope."

Student Handbook: an official statement of UHC's policies and procedures governing the various areas of student life.

Syllabus: information about a specific course, generally given out by a professor during the first class meeting.

The Gazebo: considered to be a gathering place, and the only designated smoking area on campus.

UHC PRO TIPS

1. Check your UHC email daily

This will be how UHC communicates with you. Important announcements, approaching deadlines, and news about events will only be sent to your UHC email account. If you encounter problems with your email account, contact Information Technology at (504) 398-2106.

2. Never miss the first class meeting

During the first class meeting, the entire class is laid out. You'll review the course syllabus and learn about course requirements and deadlines.

3. Take your education seriously

Take your classes and grades seriously, especially if you are majoring in an area that requires a clinical component or if you are considering graduate or professional school (pharmacy school, law school, medical school, etc.)

4. Practice time management

Deadlines approach quicker than you'd expect. Be a wise manager of your time and get your assignments done early. You'll be less stressed!

5. Proofread your assignments

Double check all papers and assignments before turning them in, and always check the spelling of a professor's name before you send him/her an email.

6. Get involved on campus

Don't zoom off campus after class! Join a campus organization, run for a student government office, or attend a student life function. Check your UHC email for event announcements.

7. Use your resources

Never be afraid to step into any office to ask for assistance. Faculty and staff can assist you with finding your classes or other areas on campus. The Center for Teaching and Learning is also available to help you with test preparation, writing papers, tutoring, and disability services.

8. Stay organized

College can be a lot to handle, so be prepared: organize your assignments, use time management skills, study with a group, use a calendar/planer, and keep your notes in a binder or notebook.



Course Placement

UHC offers opportunities to receive course credit and placement based on work completed in high school.

Official ACT/SAT scores

• If you have taken the ACT/SAT more than once, please ensure that scores from all these tests have been received by UHC Admissions. We will superscore, meaning we will use the highest Math, English, and Reading subscore to determine course placement.

College Board, AP Exams, CLEP subject exams, and International Baccalaureate exams

First semester course placement is determined by your ACT/SAT English, Reading, and Math scores and/or your UHC Accuplacer scores using the chart below.

In the event that you have not taken the ACT/SAT, or are not satisfied with the placement assigned in accordance with your ACT/SAT scores, you may opt to take our Accuplacer Placement test instead.

Class Registration

After you have met with your academic advisor to plan your class schedule, please follow the instructions below to register for your classes:

- Go to uhcno.edu.
- Click Self-Service on the top right hand side.



- 3. Log in with your UHC email address and password.
 - a. Note: Self-Service may require you to authorize your account if it is your first time logging in. Enter information required.
- 4. Once logged in, click "Register."
- 5. Click "Traditional Courses."
- 6. Select the period you are registering for. Ex: 2020/Fall.
- Click "Section Search."
- 8. In the Course Code box, using your curriculum guide, type in the course you want to search. Enter letter and numbers without any spaces. Ex: *BIO101*.
- 9. Choose your period. Ex: 2020 Fall.
- Click search.
- 11. This will prompt the sections, days, times, instructors, credits, and available seats for the course.
 - a. 📳 available seats
 - b. 📗 closed
- 12. Click the Add button to add the course to your cart.
- 13. Click New Search under the options tab.
- 14. Repeat steps 6-13 for all courses you wish to add.
- 15. Once all courses have been added to cart, click "proceed to registration."
- 16. Your added courses should now all be listed. Click the "Next" button on the bottom of the screen.
- 17. Click "Next."
- 18. Your screen should now say your schedule has been submitted to your advisor for approval. Your assigned advisor will receive your schedule notification and approve your courses.




Self Service Payments

1. Log into your Self Service using your UHC email address and assigned password. Once logged in, click on the "Finances" Tab at the top of the page.




2. Below the finances tab, click on "Make a Payment / 1098T".




3. Click on "Make a Payment" at the bottom of the screen.








